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Transmittal Letter

Dear Governor Scott & Members of the General Assembly:

The Staff and Directors of the Vermont Municipal Bond Bank (d/b/a Vermont Bond Bank) are pleased to submit to you our Annual Report for the 2021 calendar year.

The Vermont Bond Bank's mission as an instrumentality of the state is to finance social and physical infrastructure for governmental units across Vermont. Our legislative purpose includes the mandate to "foster and promote by all reasonable means" access to long-term debt financing while, to the extent possible, reducing related costs to taxpayers and residents.

Our activities are undertaken through our Pooled Loan Program and participation in the Clean Water and Drinking Water State Revolving Funds in partnership with the Department of Environmental Conservation.

The Pooled Loan Program is the primary focus of the Bond Bank. At the end of 2021, our portfolio consisted of 493 loans with a total outstanding balance of \$551 million across 193 borrowers. This activity is supported by our strong bond rating of "Aa2" and "AA+" from Moody's and S&P, respectively.

Over the course of the year, the Bond Bank loaned \$49.7 million for new projects within the Pooled Loan Program. This included 21 loans with a median size of \$1.7 million. Among other impacts, the loans supported 711 thousand square feet of facility improvements and over 18 miles in road and streetscape improvements while impacting the daily lives of over 170 thousand Vermonters.

In 2021, the Bond Bank continued to provide significant benefit for our borrowers and the State of Vermont by ensuring that governmental units have access to capital, as well as low costs, consistency in process, and reduced investments in time and resources when seeking financing.

The Bond Bank brings its 50 years of market expertise to bear across its activities. Over the past year this included \$47.91 million in bond issuance supporting new projects and \$13.75 in bond issuance for the refinancing of prior debt that resulted in a combined savings of 5 percent of refunded par. These savings were subsequently passed on to borrowers.

The following pages of this report include more information on the Bond Bank's impact over the course of the past year as well as an overview of the pooled loan portfolio as of December 31, 2021.

Thank you for your continued support in helping us to finance critical infrastructure through the state.



What We Are

Over fifty years ago, the Vermont General Assembly established the Bond Bank to provide loans for local infrastructure projects following a period of facilities construction across the state when the ability to secure long-term debt financing was at risk.

The solution embodied in the Bond Bank was a state instrumentality with a mandate to "foster and promote by all reasonable means" access to long-term debt financing while, to the extent possible, reducing related costs to taxpayers and residents.



Over the ensuing years, the Bond Bank has financed billions of dollars in local investment by purchasing and "banking" the bonds and notes of governmental units. Loans made by the Bond Bank are primarily financed through the issuance of tax-exempt bonds.


The Bond Bank is governed by a five-member Board of Directors with four appointed by the Governor and the State Treasurer serving as an ex-officio member.




The Bond Bank's pooled loan program makes loans to governmental units around the state, which include any county, municipality, school district, or other public body.



Our Impact

The Bond Bank's pooled loan program contributes to community well-being by financing social and physical infrastructure. The Bond Bank instituted a voluntary impact reporting program as part of the Pooled Loan Program in 2018.

Impact Highlights



Who: Royalton Fire District #1 Population: 2.800 **Loan Amount:** \$251.708 **Infrastructure Type:**

Issue

The Royalton Fire District #1 had a USDA-RD that originally was issued in 1991 for a 40-year term. The loan was helpful for many years but the rate was uneconomical in the current environment.

At the same time, the Fire District hoped to use the budgetary capacity gained by refinancing the loan to accelerate repairs to the water treatment plant.

Solution

The Bond Bank worked with the Fire District after reviewing its application to develop a refunding structure that would meet its operating needs. The final refunding schedule kept annual payments level to the previous structure, which resulted in the loan paying off a full year earlier.

Total savings on the \$251 thousand loan over its life will be approximately \$30 thousand—a savings of 12 percent of principal refunded.

The loan demonstrated the Bond Bank's unique ability to communities of all sizes with the same low rate regardless of the size of the loan.



Over the course of 2021 **Vermont Bond Bank** financed projects:

Who: City of St. Albans Population: 6,877 Loan Amount: \$1 Million **Infrastructure Type:** Transportation

Issue

The City of St. Albans is nearing the end of a multi-year effort to transform its downtown. The last phase of streetscape renovations were slated for Kingman Street. Included in the makeover were new streetlights, wider sidewalks, landscaping, and a new crosswalk. In addition, the project improved the sewer and water mains running along the street.

The City needed a low-cost source of financing to ensure that revenues dedicated for the project would be sufficient to cover costs while having the flexibility to compliment clean water and drinking state revolving loan fund ("SRF") loans dedicated to the project.

Impact Highlights

Solution

The Bond Bank proved to be a one stop shop for the City for the financing needed to complete the project. First, the Bond Bank approved and made a loan to the City through its Pooled Loan Program at a rate of 2.21 percent for the 20 year loan. Later, the Bond Bank executed the two complementary SRF loans after technical approval from the Department of Environmental Conservation.





Who: Town of Pownal **Population:** 3,258

Loan Amount: \$600,000 **Infrastructure Type:**

Facilities

Issue

The Town of Pownal came to the Bond Bank in summer of 2021 two years after voters first approved the town hall project and 20 years after the conversation first began. The Town needed a long term financing that could refinance (i.e. "take out") interim financing that the Town had secured to begin construction.

In addition, the Town needed a low-cost source of funds to complement the reserves that were stewarded away over the years and keep the impact to tax-payers low given a rapidly changing construction costs.



Solution

The Bond Bank provided the town a loan in summer of 2021 at a rate of 2.21 percent for twenty years. The project is indicative of the benefit the Bond Bank's Pooled Loan Program provides for towns all over Vermont where infrastructure is social in nature.

Low-cost financing for facilities is even more scarce than for traditiona infrastructure categories. The Bond Bank regularly fills this need for communities as the largest source of financing for municipal and school district projects in the state.

2021 Bond Bank Transactions

The Bond Bank issued \$47.91 million in bonds during 2021 to support new loans through the Pooled Loan Program.

Additionally, the Bond Bank issued \$13.75 million of refunding bonds that resulted in \$744 thousand, or 5 percent of refunded par, in present value savings.

The year again saw the Bond Bank pursue prudent innovation to the benefit of borrowers. On the 2022 Series 2 issuance, the bonds were issued on a taxable basis, which allowed the Bond Bank to better make use of earnings on the debt service reserve fund and increase savings.

Later in the year, the 2021 Series 4 refunding was priced in July but did not close until early September. This allowed the bonds to be called on a "current" basis within 90 days of the call date on December 1, 2021. As a result, the major market moves that caused the 10-year tax-exempt index to increase from the end of 2021 and the beginning of 2022 were avoided.

Both above strategies helped to significantly increase borrower savings over a conventional refundings.

State Revolving Loan Fund Activity

The Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation ("DEC") and the Bond Bank jointly administer the Clean Water State Revolving Fund and the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund programs. Both programs are funded through a combination of Environmental Protection Agency dollars and state matching funds.

In 2021, the Bond Bank provided credit review and financial underwriting on:

- ▶ 87 loan agreements or amendments in the amount of,
- \$58.25 million.

In addition, the Bond Bank provides on-going loan servicing of the portfolio to ensure loan repayment and timely processing of payment requests during construction. The portfolio includes \$240.75 million in loans as of December 31, 2021.





CLEAN WATER STATE REVOLVING FUND

Program provides low-interest loans for water quality protection projects to make improvements to wastewater treatment systems, control pollution from stormwater runoff, and protect sensitive water bodies.



DRINKING WATER STATE REVOLVING FUND

Program provides subsidized low-cost financing to municipal and privately-owned public water systems for capital improvements that improve public health protection and facilitate compliance with the Safe Drinking Water Act.
